

Masses Resume!!!

***Due to COVID-19, Mass is being live streamed for use on various Diocesan digital media accounts of the Catholic Diocese of Richmond, including, but not limited to, the websites of the Catholic Diocese of Richmond and the Catholic Virginian, and social media platforms of the Catholic Diocese of Richmond. Photography and/or screenshot images from the livestream may be used for the Catholic Virginian print edition. If you do not wish to be captured by live streaming, please refrain from attending that particular Mass time.

There will be some mandated changes to how we practice our Mass. Effective immediately:

- 1. You are asked to stay home if you are ill, elderly, anxious, or immunocompromised. Bishop Knestout has dispensed all Catholics in the Diocese from their Sunday Mass obligation.
- 2. If you have a fever or symptoms of Covid-19, you will not be permitted to enter the building.
- 3. You should arrive at least 30 minutes prior to the start time for Mass to allow time for temperature testing, vetting and being seated by the ushers. The ushers will let each pew know the staggered process for exiting the Church once Mass is over.
- 4. Everyone shall maintain six feet of social distance from others who are not from the same household at all times while in Church or on Church property.
- 5. Everyone 10 years and older attending Mass shall wear a Face Mask. Be sure the mask covers your nose and mouth. (Face mask should be removed only for Receiving Holy Communion.) ***<u>Anyone</u> who comes to any Mass (including daily Mass) without a face covering, will not be admitted to <u>Mass.</u>
- 6. Look for direction from the ushers when going up to receive Holy Communion. Holy Communion should be received in the hand until further notice. There will be no distribution of the Blood of Christ until further notice.
- 7. Refrain from physical contact, such as holding hands during the Our Father and shaking hands during the Sign of Peace.
- 8. Singing by the congregation is strongly discouraged.
- 9. Sanitize hands when entering and leaving Church. Bring personal supply of hand sanitizer to use before receiving Holy Communion, if possible.
- 10. No bulletins will be available at Masses. *We will continue to make the bulletins available online, through email, and mail bulletins to those without Internet access.

QUESTION OF THE WEEK We can also reflect on how similar our current situation is to that of Jesus' first followers. Like them, we also live in days of uncertainty, haunted by threats of violence, but the Beatitudes promise that what we experience today will lead to future joy. Like those women and men so many years ago, we also need to take Jesus' promises to heart and remember the blessings promised to the poor, to the meek, to mourners, and to those who suffer persecution for their faith in Christ. Reflecting on this, Sister Barbara Reid, OP, notes that the way of life outlined in the Beatitudes "is able to heal the hurtful memories of the past and to transform the present toward a hope-filled future...Jesus addresses this teaching to all His disciples and to a great crowd, inviting them to recognize their capacity for happiness in the present by espousing attitudes and

actions that will influence the future". Adults: When you heard the Beatitudes today, which one did you hear most clearly as a summons to your own life?

Children: When have you been a peacemaker among your family or friends?

SAINT OF THE WEEK

Mary was not popular with the other slaves of Roman senator Tertullus, at least in part because as the only Christian, she refused to participate in pagan rites. Tertullus found her to be an excellent servant, but feared

for her (and perhaps himself) when the emperor Diocletian's persecution of Christians increased. Tertullus hid her for a time, but eventually turned her over to the authorities. Mary was threatened with being burned alive, and ultimately was so viciously tortured that the bystanders called for her release. She was turned over to a soldier, who helped her escape. She spent the rest of her life in quiet service to the Lord. St. Mary the Slave's feast day is November 1st.

DO YOU KNOW?

The Divine Mercy Chaplet was established in the 1930's after Saint Faustina received it

from Jesus in one of her many visions. Although it is prayed on Rosary beads, the majority of Our Fathers, Hail Mary's, and

Glory Be's are replaced by prayers that plead for God's mercy for the world on the merits of the love and mercy Jesus offered

us through His suffering during His Sorrowful Passion. It is widely believed to bring mercy to all sinners who trust in God's mercy through Jesus. It is also believed to bring infinite mercy to the dying when said in their presence. Praying the Divine Mercy Chaplet can enrich our souls in various ways. It helps us to humble ourselves by requiring us to admit that we are sinners living in a sinful world, and we desperately need God's mercy. It also reminds us of the eternal love, mercy and grace that Jesus gave us when He suffered and died on the cross.

A reading from the Book of Revelation

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A Different Kind of Political Engagement

September 2020

Election Day is November 3. In *Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship* (www.faithfulcitizenship.org), we and our brother U.S. bishops noted, "Unfortunately, politics in our country often can be a contest of powerful interests, partisan attacks, sound bites, and media hype. The Church calls for a different kind of political engagement: one shaped by the moral convictions of well-formed consciences and focused on the dignity of every human being, the pursuit of the common good, and the protection of the weak and the vulnerable. ... We are called to bring together our principles and our political choices, our values and our votes, to help build a civilization of truth and love" (no. 14).

To grow in holiness, a question each one of us must answer is: How will I respond to this call for a different kind of engagement? This question is key as we approach Election Day, as well as every day before and after it, as faithful citizens.

In a pre-election letter on voting decisions we issued last year, we offered three main points:

- Many issues are important.
- Not all issues have equal moral weight.
- Protecting life is paramount.

As bishops responsible for the pastoral care of the faithful in our two dioceses, we re-offer these points here for your continued prayerful consideration, as an essential framework not only for the critical voting decisions that must be made each year but also for the vital prayer and advocacy that must be done on a constant basis.

Whenever human dignity is at stake for any of our brothers and sisters in the human family, we must be attentive and engaged. "[R]espect for the dignity of every person ... is the core of Catholic moral and social teaching" (*Faithful Citizenship*, no. 10).

Our moral obligation to oppose intrinsically evil acts – which are "always incompatible with love of God and neighbor" (*Faithful Citizenship*, no. 22) – "has a special claim on our consciences and our actions" (no. 37). Of these, abortion is the "preeminent priority because it directly attacks life itself, because it takes place within the sanctuary of the family, and because of the number of lives destroyed" (*Faithful Citizenship*, Introductory Letter). Since the 1973 *Roe v*. *Wade* decision, there have been more than 61 million abortions in our country. Other issues of grave moral importance "undercut the dignity of the human person" (nos. 22, 23). Our priority must be to protect life to the fullest extent possible.

The side-by-side comparison was compiled jointly by a number of state Catholic conferences, including the Virginia Catholic Conference.

On November 3, please vote. Every day, please seek and live out the "different kind of political engagement" that will provide a clear example to others of the civility and consistent concern for the common good we are all called to embrace.
