Masses Continue to be Offered!

***Due to COVID-19, Mass is being live streamed for use on various Diocesan digital media accounts of the Catholic Diocese of Richmond, including, but not limited to, the websites of the Catholic Diocese of Richmond and the Catholic Virginian, and social media platforms of the Catholic Diocese of Richmond. Photography and/or screenshot images from the livestream may be used for the Catholic Virginian print edition. If you do not wish to be captured by live streaming, please refrain from attending that particular Mass time.

There will be some mandated changes to how we practice our Mass. Effective immediately:

- You are asked to stay home if you are ill, elderly, anxious, or immunocompromised. Bishop Knestout has dispensed all Catholics in the Diocese from their Sunday Mass obligation.
- 2. If you have a fever or symptoms of Covid-19, you will not be permitted to enter the building.
- You should arrive early for Mass to allow time for temperature testing, vetting and being seated by the ushers. The ushers will let each pew know the staggered process for exiting the Church once Mass is over.
- Everyone shall maintain six feet of social distance from others who are not from the same household at all times while in Church or on Church property.
- 5. Everyone 5 years and older attending Mass shall wear a Cloth Face Mask. Those who cannot wear a cloth mask may wear a face shield. Be sure the mask covers your nose and mouth. (Face mask should be removed only for Receiving Holy Communion.) ***Anyone who comes to any Mass (including daily Mass) without a face covering, will not be admitted to Mass.
- Look for direction from the ushers when going up to receive Holy Communion. Holy Communion should be received in the hand until further notice. There will be no distribution of the Blood of Christ until further notice.
- 7. Refrain from physical contact, such as holding hands during the Our Father and shaking hands during the Sign of Peace.
- Singing by the congregation is strongly discouraged.
- Sanitize hands when entering and leaving Church. Bring personal supply of hand sanitizer to use before receiving Holy Communion, if possible.
- No bulletins will be available at Masses. *We will continue to make the bulletins available online, through email, and mail bulletins to those without Internet access.

Perhaps we can consider sanctifying our Sundays with reading Scripture or making a pilgrimage to a holy site to pray. In this way, we can turn our eyes toward the Lord and truly call it the Lord's Day.

SAINT OF THE WEEK

On March 9th, we celebrate St. Dominic Savio, the patron saint of boys, children's choirs, falsely accused people and juvenile delinguents. Dominic, one of 10 children of a blacksmith and a seamstress, was born in 1842 in Italy. His mentor was Saint John Bosco. He lived the fullest and holiest life that he could. He encouraged his friends to come with him to visit the Blessed Sacrament and taught catechism to younger children. He went to confession every week and received Holy Communion daily, even forming a club called the Sodality of the Immaculate Conception to encourage frequent reception of the Eucharist. He died from bad health at the age of 15,

seeing visions of Heaven awaiting him.

DO YOU KNOW?

It is estimated that between 18,000 and 20,000 victims are trafficked into the United States every year. Children are more vulnerable than adults. They're easier to control, cheaper, and less likely to demand working conditions, researchers explained. More than 300,000 young people in the U.S. are considered "at risk" of sexual exploitation.

From Fr. Banive Peralte in Haiti

Greetings from Saints Peter and Paul Parish. I hope you are well and it has been a great weekend for you and your loved ones. For my part, thank God I'm fine. But I must also tell you that I feel very stressed because of the situation in my parish and my country. Although we are at peace in Marmont but the economic situation of the parish is zero. We have debts that we cannot pay. AS you know, we cannot live without the support of our partners when since the beginning of this year we have not yet received any help from them. This is why our economic capacity to operate the pastoral activities of the parish is difficult right now. As far as Haiti is concerned, this country is on the brink of abyss due to political unrest. Currently the country is on the verge of explosion, the daily life of the people is made up of deaths, murders, impunity, insecurity. At the origin of this political crisis, it is the effective date of the start of Jovenel Moise's mandate that is disputed. According to President Jovenel his mandate will end on February 7, 2022. But his opponents believe that in accordance with the Constitution, he ended on February 7, 2021. Despite pressure from the opposition who has appointed a new interim president, Jovenel Moise refuses to leave power, as provided for in the Constitution. In addition to the severe crisis affecting domestic politics, there are economic problems and a dramatically deteriorating security situation. This is the situation Haiti is currently in. Please pray for us. Thank you for your effort you make to help us. Please say hello to all the faithful of your parish. I thank them all for their solidarity and generosity. Also, I want to take the opportunity to wish you all a good entry into the Lenten season. May God bless you all.

A Reading from the Holy Gospel according to John
