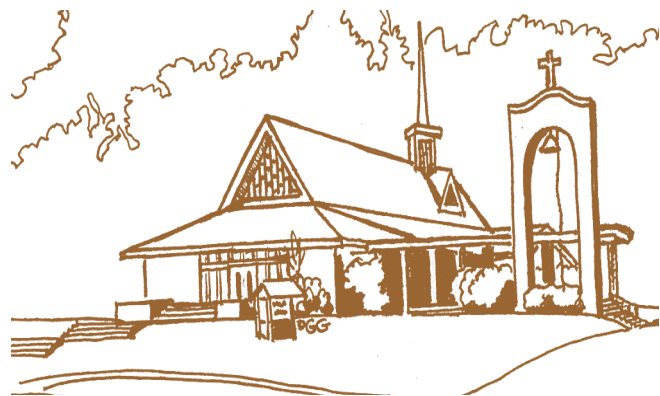

Per the Virginia Department of Health:

ADVENT/CHRISTMAS

The word "Christmas" comes from old English, meaning *the Mass of Christ or Christ's Mass* and Bethlehem in English means "House of Bread".

"I am the Bread of Life. He who comes to me will never go hungry". (John 6:35)

"Take this Bread and eat it, It IS my body..." (Mark 14:22)

And the Manger, Christ's first crib, was a lamb's feed box:

" Behold the Lamb of God sent to take away the sins of the world" (John 1:29)

"I am the living bread that came down from heaven. If anyone eats of this bread, he will live forever. This bread is my flesh, which I will give for the life of the world." (John 6:51)

THE YEAR OF ST. JOSEPH

St. Joseph Most Faithful

Faith is one of the three theological virtues (faith, hope, and charity). But what exactly is faith? How is it defined?

The Letter to the Hebrews gives us a good definition. It states: "Faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen" (Heb 11:1).

Christian faith acknowledges who Jesus is, adheres to His teaching, and trusts in His promises.

St. Joseph exercised an active, trusting, and zealous faith. He never doubted the divinity of Jesus or His power to conquer evil. To the world,

Jesus looked like an ordinary child, but St. Joseph knew He was God. St. Joseph was always aware that in seeing Jesus, he was gazing upon God Almighty. St.

Joseph was faithful to Jesus in good times and in bad. Imitate the faith and loving trust of St. Joseph. Be steadfast, trusting, and intrepid in your faith.

SAINT OF THE WEEK

December 4th - St. John Damascene,

Priest and Doctor of the Church

Born about 675 in Damascus (Syria), John died near Jerusalem about 749. He was a Christian official in a Moslem government. He became a monk and later presbyter at Mar Saba monastery near Jerusalem, where he was renowned as a theologian and biblical commentator. He was noted for his vigorous defense of the veneration of images against the iconoclasts, for his theological writings synthesizing the thought of the Greek Fathers, and for his poetry and hymnody.

The oplatek shared around the family table is a white wafer. You may have seen colored wafers, mostly pink. Another legend says that the animals talked on that first Christmas Eve. The pink wafer is shared with the animals in honor of those animals that kept the Christ Child warm in the stable and the sheep that came with the shepherds who were the first to receive the good news.

Blessing of the Oplatki

Lord, Jesus Christ, the bread of angels,
the living bread of eternal life,
graciously deign to bless these wafers

of body and soul. Bless the families
who share these wafers on Christmas Eve and
guide their hearts to freely give to others
what you have so generously given to us.

We ask this through Christ our Lord
Who lives and reigns for ever and ever. Amen.

WHAT ARE OPLATKI?

Oplatki are thin wafers made from flour and water, similar to communion hosts. The rectangular wafers usually have a Christmas image stamped into them.

Oplatki (*o-pawh-t-kee*) is the plural form; *oplatek (o-pawh-tek)* is the singular form.

The Polish word "oplatki" is derived from the Latin word "oblata" meaning "offering."

CHRISTMAS EVE in a Polish home is rich in symbolism. The celebration which

is called the Wigilia (*vee-gee-lee-ah*) begins with the appearance of the first star which symbolizes the Star of Bethlehem that announced the Great Light was coming into the world. The table where the family gathers for dinner has some hay/straw under a white tablecloth to commemorate the Christ Child's birth in the manger. The eldest member of the family takes an opiatek wafer, offers greetings and best wishes for the new year, and shares it with the person next to him/her. The wafer makes its way around the table with everyone breaking off a piece and offering good wishes. This shows the giving and sharing in our lives. The meal is meatless and usually consists of an odd number of courses beginning with a simple soup. Fish, mushrooms, sauerkraut, pierogi, cabbage rolls with meatless filling, poppy seed rolls, and fruitcakes are some of the dishes that grace the table. The fish is either a carp or a pike. The head of the pike contains bones in the shape of a cross and nails ~ the tools of Christ's crucifixion. An empty chair is placed at the table in memory of loved ones no longer with us or for a stranger who may show up in need of a meal. After the meal and lighting of the Christmas tree, the family prepares for the Pasterka (Shepherd's Midnight Mass).

A BRIEF HISTORY OF OPLATKI

As with most legends and traditions, it is difficult to determine the exact beginning; but this tradition can be traced to the early days of Christianity. The custom soon spread from Poland to the Lithuanians and Slovaks. When the Polish people migrated to America, at Christmas time the relatives/friends from the Old Country would send oplatki to their families in America. This was a way of uniting families in spirit on Christmas Eve as the bread was broken and shared.

Sharing the opiatek is a foreshadowing of the liturgical partaking of the Eucharist at Mass. Just as we share in the Eucharist as one family in Christ, we share the opiatek with family members as a sign of reconciliation and family unity. It is a reminder of our daily bread and the Bread of Life who was born as a man this Christmas Eve night.

When the Russians invaded Poland bringing destruction and persecution, the Poles had to learn to carry their religion close to their hearts rather than out in the open. As Christmas would approach, families were anxious to find a way to send the wafers to other family members (especially family in America) without alerting the mail censors. According to one family's legend, a family in America received a holiday card from its family members in the Old Country. It looked like a regular Christmas greeting card with a red decorative disk attached. This disk was actually an opiatek cut in the shape of a circle, tinted red for Christ's Divine Love (and not for communism as the censors may have believed). While this story may not be true, it illustrates how deeply the Polish people feel about this tradition of sharing and family unity.

Despite its simplicity, the custom has made its way into countless households of all ethnicities which find its rich symbolism an adaptable annual custom of profound meaning.
