The Year of Grace, with Divine Mercy

Why celebrate Divine Mercy Sunday?

Jesus gave an extraordinary promise of grace to all those who would receive Holy Communion in the state of grace on Divine Mercy Sunday., saying they would "obtain complete forgiveness of sins and punishment" (Diary, 699). That means not only is the person forgiven for any mortal or venial sins they may have committed, but also that they will receive a complete remission of the temporal punishment due for sin- that is , no Purgatory. The great theologian Fr. Ignacy Rozycki compared the graces of Divine Mercy Sunday to a "second baptism." How great is the Divine Mercy!

The first Sunday after Easter is the Feast of Mercy, but there must also be acts of mercy. "I demand from you deeds of mercy, which are to arise out of love for Me. You are to show mercy to your neighbors always and everywhere. You must not shrink from this or try to excuse or absolve yourself from it. (742)

To fittingly observe the Feast of Mercy, we should:

- 1. Celebrate the Feast on the Sunday after Easter;
- 2. Sincerely repent of all our sins;
- 3. Place our complete trust in Jesus;
- Go to Confession, preferably before that Sunday;
- Receive Holy Communion on the day of the Feast;
- 6. Venerate* the image of the Divine Mercy; and
- 7. Be merciful to others, through our actions, words, and prayers on their behalf.

 *To venerate a sacred image or statue simply mean to perform some act or make some gesture of deep religious respect toward it because of the person whom it represents-in this case, our Most Merciful Savior.

Jesus' Death is Our Example

"Jesus, who upon entering into the world said: "I have come, O God, to do your will" (cf. Heb 10:9), made himself obedient to the Father in everything and, "having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end" (Jn 13:1), giving himself completely for them. He who had come "not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many" (Mk 10:45), attains on the Cross the heights of love: "Greater love has no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends" (Jn 15:13). And he died for us while we were yet sinners (cf. Rom 5:8). In this way Jesus proclaims that life finds its center, its meaning and its fulfillment when it is given up. At this point our meditation becomes praise and thanksgiving, and at the same time urges us to imitate Christ and follow in his footsteps (cf. 1 Pt 2:21). We too are called to give our lives for our brothers and sisters, and thus to realize in the fullness of truth the meaning and destiny of our existence." St. John Paul II, The Gospel of Life, n. 51.

The Season of Lent

- Hosanna Means "Save, Please!"
- In moments like this, we realize we cannot save ourselves and we need to connect to our source of security quickly. In the firecracker example, that security is the person with the firecracker in their hand. In our spiritual lives though, that security is in God. In its purest form, this is worship as we feel we have to come to the end of ourselves and we need God to intervene.

Hosanna Means "Salvation! Thank You!"

- Throughout different translations and edits, the original plea to "please, save us!" changed to a proclamation of "Salvation! Thank you!" We read in Psalms 118:25, "Lord, grant salvation! Lord, grant good fortune.!" This is the only time this plea is used. Right after that, in verse 26, there is a shift from concern to confidence.
- Verse 26 says, "Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord." This is a great example of <u>faith</u> and a demonstration of the shift from Old Testament to New Testament. Today, we hear songs like the ones described in the opening and read scriptures in the New Testament where "hosanna" is used more as a term of adoration and praise.

Please remember that <u>Good Friday is a Day of Fast and</u> <u>Abstinence</u> and that <u>ALL Fridays during Lent are Days of Abstinence</u>.

Lent Challenge – Want to do something as a family for Lent? Choose a challenge! "Miles for Meals" Rise Against Hunger or "Walk for Water" Rice Bowl. Pray for others that go without these necessities, locally and around the world. You can pick up your challenge at the back of the Church. One per household, please. Directions are included.

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

- This worship service is based on an early Christian service called Tenebrae. The word Tenebrae is the Latin word for "darkness" or "shadows."
- The mood is somber and mournful.
- We feel a small part of Christ's pain during His Passion and His crucifixion.
- At the beginning of the service, the church lights are on. On the altar, there is a single candle between two candelabras. The single candle is called the Christ candle. All candles are lit.
- There are seven meditations: 4 scripture readings and 3 sung meditations. After each meditation, a candle on each candelabra is extinguished. Midway through the meditations, the church lights are dimmed. After the seventh meditation, the altar lights are put out making the church darker.
- As it gets darker and darker, we reflect on the great emotional and physical pain Jesus must have felt.
- At the end of the service, the Christ candle is taken out of view, making it appear as if the forces of evil have won over good.
- A loud noise (*strepitus*) is heard signifying the stone closing the tomb.
- The Christ candle is then restored to its place on the altar, indicating the promise of Christ's triumph over sin and darkness.
- By this single light, we all depart the service in silence.

A Short History of Tenebrae

Tenebrae - the Latin word for darkness - has been celebrated by the church since medieval times. It was usually celebrated during Matins and Lauds during the Holy Triduum and was a service for the Monastic communities. Now, it is most often celebrated on the evening of the Wednesday before Holy Thursday, which is referred to as "Spy Wednesday."


The scripture meditations, as well as the sung meditations, give us a sense of Christ's passion; the agony and ridicule He endured. There is not only an impending sense of doom but also one of darkness.

"Tenebrae gradually began disappearing after Pope Pius XII's reform of the Paschal Triduum, because the reformed rubrics really did not accommodate Tenebrae as it had come to exist. Tenebrae was supposed to be an anticipation of Lauds and Matins, but the revision of the Paschal Triduum restored Lauds and Matins to the morning, and it's hard to have a Service of Shadows in the morning. Later, revision of the Liturgy of the Hours also further displaced Tenebrae.

Still, Tenebrae - at least in some adapted form - appears to be making a comeback."

During Tenebrae, the vanishing light from the extinguished candles reminds us that we, as sinners, without Christ, "dwell in darkness."



SPY WEDNESDAY is a good day to look inward to analyze our motives and our intentions.

Judas sold out Jesus for 30 pieces of silver. Have you sold him out? And for what? No time to pray, but you have time to play computer games? Skipping Mass while on vacation or for a social event? Doing these things show that we put more value on the them than we do on Jesus.

This is a good day to do a thorough examination of conscience. Perhaps we will find that we need to make another confession before entering Holy Week.
